Philadelphia's skyline is about to change again. After years of being "ruled" by a gentlemen's agreement that no structure should be taller than William Penn's statue atop City Hall, the completion of Liberty Place in 1987 led the way for a number of new skyscrapers that dwarfed the Penn statue. Upon its opening later this year, the new Comcast Tower on John F. Kennedy Boulevard between 17th Street and 18th Street will surpass Liberty Place as the city's tallest building, reaching a height of 975 feet.

The Tower will add 1.1 million square feet of office space to the Center City market, with a 6story parking garage and retail area at its base. The ground level will offer a large atrium which will also serve as a new entrance to SEPTA's Penn Center/Suburban Station complex. It will also be the first Center City skyscraper to be designed and built using code changes and lessons learned from the World Trade Center destruction.

The speakers will offer an in-depth presentation on the challenges and difficulties faced and resolved with this undertaking. Some of the unique aspects of the building will be covered, including:

• the design and construction of structural systems such as the shear wall, vierendeel trusses, and tuned liquid column damper system

- the preservation of a historic church building that exists in the northwest quadrant of the site
- the complications and intricacies associated with construction on a busy downtown location



John Abruzzo, a Vice President of Thornton Tomasetti, is a recognized leader in the field of Forensic Engineering. He holds degrees in civil engineering and is a registered Professional Engineer in the State of Pennsylvania. He has extensive experience working with a wide variety of materials and design types including high-rise and long-span steel structures. He possesses specialized knowledge in assessing and predicting the behavior of steel and reinforced concrete connections, structural stability, blast analysis, non-linear analysis, materials testing, data acquisition and testing of structural elements. *Continued on Page 3*

Mr. Abruzzo has investigated some of the most significant structural collapses in the United States including the collapses of L'Ambiance Plaza Condominiums, the Schoharie Creek Thruway Bridge and the Miller Park (Milwaukee Brewers' baseball stadium) crane collapse. In the aftermath of the events of September 11, he has been involved in numerous government and private sector projects involving the determination of blast loads, possible structure hardening schemes and progressive collapse studies for several highrise and special-use buildings.

Politics and Engineering — YMF Critical Issues Seminar on Wednesday March 14, 2007, at the Elephant and Castle Pub

"We in America do not have government by the majority. We have government by the majority who participate." -Thomas Jefferson

This was the quote that Brian Pallasch recited in his closing remarks to the seminar attendees. As you can probably imagine from the quote above, the central message from the panel to the 30-plus attendees during this year's annual Critical Issues Seminar was "get more involved, today!" The panel of experts assembled this year included:

• Brian T. Pallasch, CAE - ASCE National Director of Governmental Relations

• Eric L. Flicker, P.E. — Chief Financial Officer of Pennoni Associates Inc., Past National Chairman of the American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC), and 2006 Delaware Valley Engineer of the Year

• Spencer T. Finch, P.E. — Director of Sustainable Development, Pennsylvania Environmental Council

• Michael R. Boyer — Manager of the Office of Long-Range Planning and Congestion Management, Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission

Spencer Finch mentioned that, of the 435 members of Congress currently in office, less than 5 are Engineers, and none among them have made a major issue of getting funding for the rehabilitation of our nation's infrastructure. If we do not represent ourselves to our legislators, "we are letting others do surgery on our work."

The moderator of the event, Dave Petrucci, conducted the evening well and brought several poignant questions to the panel for consideration and discussion. These included information on

BRANIGAN RETIRES



2007 STORMWATER MANAGEMENT SYMPOSIUM

The 2007 Pennsylvania Stormwater Management Symposium will be conducted on October 17 and 18, 2007 at Villanova University. This marks the seventh such symposium conducted by Villanova.

The purpose of the symposium is to advance the knowledge and understanding of sustainable stormwater management for those dealing in all aspects of planning, design, construction, maintenance and operations, and regulatory compliance. A half-day workshop for nonengineers will be held preceding the symposium on October 16.

The symposium will begin with a keynote speaker addressing stormwater management issues in Pennsylvania. The remainder of the conference will include multiple sessions of papers presented by professionals in the area, panels discussing stormwater issues, and tours. New this year will be a poster session where design firms will be encouraged to present their projects to the symposium. Lunches will be provided both days and the proceedings will be published. An informal reception will be held at the end of the first day. CEU's will be given for attendance at the symposium.

ASCE LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS DAY IN HARRISBURG

The four Pennsylvania Sections of ASCE (Central PA, Lehigh Valley, Pittsburgh and Philadelphia) released the **PA Infrastructure Report Card** in 2006. The report card alerted the public and our elected officials of a crisis in the condition of the Commonwealth's Infrastructure. In November 2006, the Governor's Transportation Funding and Reform Commission released a report that validated the Report Card's findings on the critical needs for Transit, Highways and Bridges.

We will be visiting our elected officials in Harrisburg on **Tuesday**, **May 8**, **2007**, and we need your participation.

The day will consist of a kick-off session with speakers outlining our positions and how to have effective meetings with our elected officials. You will then have between one and three meetings with elected officials to review the findings of the PA Infrastructure Report Card (www.pareportcard.org), express our support for the findings of the Governor's Transportation Funding Commission, and indicate your interest in providing your professional knowledge to support important policy decisions effecting the health, safety and welfare of Pennsylvanians

PAST PRESIDENT MENNA NOMINEE FOR GOVERNOR

Don't we already have some guy named Rendell in this spot? Well, yes, but we're not talking about THAT Governor!

Our own **Christopher Menna**, ASCE, Phila. Section Past President, was recently selected as an official nominee for At-Large Governor of ASCE Region 2 by the Region 2 Nominating Committee. Look for Chris' name on the ballot when it comes out this summer and, as we do in Philadelphia, please be sure to vote early and often. If elected, Chris will serve a three-year term ending in 2010.

Region 2 was formed in 2005 during a governance shake-up of ASCE. Region 2. It includes all ASCE members in Pennsylvania (formerly District 4), Delaware, Maryland and the District of Colombia metropolitan area. All 10,000 ASCE members in Region 2 are the electorate for Governor positions.

There are six Region 2 Governors. All of the governors are truly At-Large; they represent all the members in the region. [This is different from other Region governance structures. For example, Region 1 has a Governor position that must be filled by a member from a small section like Mohawk Valley or Vermont.]

David Hanly is currently serving a two-year at-large governor term ending in October 2008. Dave was appointed to that position by the Region 2 Formation Team (R2FT.) It sounds a little suspicious, but Chris was on the R2FT and chaired the nominating committee for the appointments. (*Is this the "payback," Dave? – Ed.*)

Chris was nominated by our Section. The Region 2 nominating Committee received four nominations and chose to forward two official nominees to be placed on the ballot from the. Chris was one of the two selected as an official nominee. The other official nominee is **Kim Parker Brown** from the National Capitol Section.

Also, **Jeremy Colello** was elected as the Younger Member Representative to the Region 2 Board of Governors. He will have a non-voting position, alongside Chris and the other Governors.

The Philadelphia Section's representative on the Region 2 Nominating Committee was Section Board Member **Soheila Rahbari**.

MARCH JOINT DINNER MEETING

Wednesday, March 21, 2007 Downtown Club, Center City Philadelphia *The Status of Pennsylvania's Transportation Program by Bob Wright, Editor*

Even with a last-minute change in speaker, venue, date and topic, something that happened so quickly that even THE NEWS wasn't able to catch it, nearly 200 people turned out for a chance to hear the Pennsylvania Secretary of Transportation, **Allen Biehler**, present information on the State's transportation plans for the future. The occasion was the annual joint meeting among the Mid-Atlantic Section, Institute of Transportation Engineers (MASITE), the Philadelphia Chapter of the Women's Transportation Seminar (WTS), the Engineers' Club of Philadelphia (ECP), and our Section.

ASCE, Phila. Section President Carol Martsolf opened the meeting with a few announcements, and then switched hats to become WTS Philadelphia Chapter President Martsolf for several other updates. Younger Member Forum President John Federico brought everyone up to speed on the Forum's planned events. ECP President (and Past ASCE, Phila. Section President) Ruben David offered information on coming Club meetings. MASITE President Jeannette Quiris provided some insight into what MASITE has planned for the next few months.

With all the various technical society Presidents out of the way, President Martsolf welcomed newly-installed **PennDOT District 6 Executive Lester Toaso** to the podium for some words of wisdom, which concluded with his bringing his predecessor, **Deputy Secretary of Transportation Rina Cutler**, to the dais. She reminded those present that March is **Women's History Month** and proceeded to cite some obviously-dated pointers given to employers hiring women in the transportation industry in 1943. (No, we will NOT print these for your amusement or horror, but we will remind you that things were a bit different in our world 60plus years ago!)

Deputy Secretary Cutler introduced Secretary Biehler for the evening's main presentation. The Secretary opened his segment with some background on how he was selected for the position and the many interesting situations he must face in the direction of an over-12,000 employee organization. He noted that the Department has had more than its fair share of bad press recently, but this only represents the very challenging and often thankless task that it faces in its daily duties in the provision of mobility for the residents of the State.

Funding is a significant issue in the operation of the Department, and Secretary Biehler highlighted the many problems that must be faced in this regard. The report was issued last November by the Transportation Funding Reform Commission. As the Section was advised at both our November and January meetings this season, funding is at a critical "crossroads" as construction costs continue to rise and outstrip other inflation and price indexes, and needs continue to grown both in the preservation of existing systems as well as the necessary expansion to serve growing areas. The Commission noted that almost \$1 billion is needed to cover anticipated needs and costs in highways and mass transit, and a host of various options for revenue enhancement and growth have been suggested. The Secretary noted that the General Assembly must take some long, hard looks at this to make key decisions on how this funding will be provided. As we know, the General Assembly has had some radical changes of its own following last November's elections.

Secretary Biehler reiterated that the solutions are certainly neither easy nor painless. One major source of new highway revenue is an increased gas tax, however Pennsylvania's tax is already among the higher rates in the nation, and the recommended 12.5 cent increase would result in the State rising to the top of this list. Governor Rendell would prefer to ease the burden on citizens, thus other possibilities include increased taxes on oil company profits and higher driver's license and vehicle registration fees. The last-mentioned fees are on the low side compared to other states.

One of the "hot topics" in the news lately is the privatization/lease of the Pennsylvania Turnpike to private investors for a 30-year term. Secretary Biehler explained that nearly 50 firms have expressed interest in this proposal, which could raise at least \$900 million a year for PennDOT and



\$65 million a year for municipal governments to use for local streets and bridges. This could also involve the imposition of tolls on other Interstate Highways around the State, in particular I-79, I-80, I-81 and I-95. Obvioulsy this has its own controversy associated with it.

Public transit agencies around the State, already without a dedicated source of funding, probably have few options other than a combination of cost reductions and fare increases. Secretary Biehler noted that this has a significant impact on working people (statewide, over 60% of transit trips are people traveling to and from work) and the mobility of those who cannot or do not drive. In the latter category, senior citizens and urban poor are heavily represented. Governor Rendell has advised transit operators to develop two budgets for the coming fiscal year, to reflect scenarios in which State funding will be either reduced or completely eliminated. Secretary Biehler added that, locally, SEPTA has already begun to publicize a two-alternative budget for public review and input.

After several poignant questions from the attendees were ably covered by Secretary Biehler, Section President Martsolf thanked him and all present from ASCE, WTS, ECP and MASITE, and presented him with tokens of each group's appreciation for his appearance on very short notice.

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
