The Future of the US 422 Corridor

The last meeting of the 2008-09 season was apparently a "place to be" for local Engineers and Planners, as 180 of us added to the general congestion in the King of Prussia area to learn how much longer some of that congestion will be with us. (There must be something about King of Prussia — maybe the malls?—that draws out crowds, as we typically see these kinds of numbers at our other event in this area, the annual joint meeting with the Delaware Valley Section, American Society of Highway Engineers.) To "bring home" the idea of congestion, the crowd at the cocktail hour before the event did its best to mimic some of the worst jams on the Schuylkill Expressway — it was indeed tough to navigate around the lobby area with all those in attendance!

Section President-Elect Kristen Bowman Kavanagh managed to bring things to order, settle the crowd and introduce herself as the fill-in for President Mark Tiger, who was unable to attend. As the Mid-Atlantic Section, Institute of Transportation Engineers (MASITE) was cosponsoring the meeting, President-Elect Kava-

nagh brought MASITE President (and Section Director — small world!) **Jenn Walsh** to the podium for her own welcome and announcements.

# ENGINEERS LEGISLATIVE DAY — A "THREE-PEAT"

On **Tuesday, May 12, 2009,** roughly 70 Engineers from around the state found their ways to Harrisburg for **Legislative Day 2009.** This event was started by ASCE's four Pennsylvania Sections in 2007 to highlight the statewide **Infrastructure Report Card.** This year, the Pennsylvania Society of Professional Engineers (PSPE) took the lead in organizing and scheduling the day.

A specific focus on several key topics including Transportation Funding, Revised Continuing Education Requirements for Engineers, Qualifications Based Selection, and Support Funding for Math and Engineering Needs was the order of the day. A number of participants attended a hearing held by the House Professional Licensure Committee on legislation on the establishment of continuing education requirements for Engineers, Surveyors and Geologists. (Action on this legislation, House Bill 975, is expected, as it was reported out of Committee in June. We will keep you posted.

Along with PSPE and ASCE, representatives from the American Council of Engineering Companies of Pennsylvania (ACEC), the American Society of Highway Engineers (ASHE), and the Engineers' Club of Philadelphia took part in the day's happenings.

#### **BILL POLK**

**William Harris Polk,** 93, an Engineer and Public Transit Expert who was active in the creation of SEPTA, passed away on April 25, 2009.

While growing up in Madison, Wisconsin, Mr. Polk visited one of his grandmothers at the local train station, where she was a ticket clerk. He loved watching the trains pull into the station and discovered his passion for railroads. After he graduated from the University of Wisconsin in 1937, he worked for a steel company for just over a year, but drifted to follow his interests and took a position at the Chicago, Milwaukee, St. Paul and Pacific Railroad (also known as the Milwaukee Road) when he got the chance.

Another job led him to Philadelphia in 1957, where the call of the rails once again enticed him and he joined the staff of the newly organized Passenger Service Improvement Corporation in 1961. The nonprofit agency was formed to increase ridership on local rail lines. Three years later, this organization morphed into what we know today as SEPTA, which the Pennsylvania legislature had established to provide transit for metropolitan Philadelphia.

In 1970, Gov. Raymond Shafer appointed him as Deputy Secretary for the newly formed Pennsylvania Department of Transportation. For the next 13 years, Mr. Polk worked with communities to improve rail and bus service. Following his retirement from PennDOT in 1983, he served on the Montgomery County Transportation Advisory Committee and SEPTA's Regional Citizens' Advisory Committee, where he was an advocate for preserving rail and bus lines threatened with closure.

In addition to his wife, Jean, Mr. Polk is survived by a son, two daughters, three grandchildren, and four great-grandchildren.

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# SECTION GOES ELECTRONIC THE NEWS GOING DIGITAL

We're going to enter the 21st century, albeit 10 years later than most others — that is, the ASCE, Philadelphia Section will be moving to electronic correspondence at the end of this year. Starting with the December/January 2010 edition of *THE NEWS*, we will be changing our distribution methods, with e-mail becoming the "default."

Postage and printing costs continue to increase, and we see the e-mail option as a major tool available to us to save the over \$15,000 we spend each season on these combined expenditures. These savings can be allocated into other areas in our budget, meaning we can better utilize these resources on programs, meetings and other items which generally have more tangible benefits to our members.

Over the past several years, we have offered e-mail delivery of *THE NEWS* as an option to members. E-mailing allows *THE NEWS* to get in your hands quickly and efficiently. Over 200 members have opted for this to date and they have found that *THE NEWS* gets to them at least one week faster than via conventional mailing.

Mailing delays, which are generally beyond our control, play havoc with the time sensitivity of items in *THE NEWS* such as meeting notices and reservation deadlines. A number of years ago, we changed our mail delivery from bulk rate to pre-sorted first class to take advantage of the touted faster delivery of first-class mail. We decided to pay the higher rate to get *THE NEWS* to you as quickly as possible. This does not always happen, and our experience has been that we are still subject to seasonal and mail-volume delays that result in less-than-timely receipt of *THE NEWS* by many members.

E-mailing will also allow us to reach a larger segment of our membership. Currently, only those who pay Section dues receive *THE NEWS*, again in our attempts to keep costs as low as possible. We would expand delivery of *THE NEWS* to all assigned Section members as part of the change to e-mail.

We are additionally looking to change the way we e-mail *THE NEWS*. At present, it is a large attached file and has had some problems in the past with server firewalls, size limitations, etc. Among the methods being considered are a "hot link" to our website, where *THE NEWS* would be posted immediately upon release of the current edition.

We do not have current e-mail addresses for all of our members. Thus, we may need to obtain your preferred e-mail address at some point in the coming season to keep our address book current and make sure we have the correct address so *THE NEWS* can continue to reach you in a timely fashion.

We realize that not all of you are ready for this, or have e-mail capability or computer savvy, so we would still retain the hard-copy mailing option if you so prefer. If you would like to continue receiving a hard copy in addition to the e-mailed version, please notify us at info@asce-philly.org by the end of the year.

recognized was **Temple University. Bechara Abboud,** Student Chapter Advisor, had his own "cheering section" of over 50 of his favorite students, and President **Andrew Rodzon** gave an update on happenings there. Lastly, **Villanova University** Student Chapter President **David Mensching** got a few minutes to speak (apparently he and his fellow students must have been unable to get Final Four tickets?).

**Vicki Brown** and her own contingent of about 10 **Widener** students listened to their fellow students intently. (We thought we'd mention that they were there.)

Membership Secretary **Chris Wright** cited the newly-inducted **Life Members.** (See the separate article on this.)

President-Elect Kavanagh thanked the Past Presidents who came out on their night. Ruben David, Allan Moore, Chris Rood, Faruq Siddiqui and Bob Wright came forward and were recognized.

#### **OUR FEATURED PRESENTATION**

Surprisingly there was still time for a presentation, and Past President **Bob Wright** introduced the evening's speaker, **Leo Bagley**, Section Chief, Transportation Planning and Assistant Director, Montgomery County Planning Commission (MCPC).

Mr. Bagley opened with the overview of the R6 Extension project developed by AECOM/DMJM Harris. This report is a follow-up effort to the previous studies in this corridor, most notably those covering the Schuylkill Valley Metro (SVM). SVM was undertaken in the mid-1990's but found not to be feasible or fundable with a \$2.2 billion price tag. A Governor's Task Force revisited it in 2005 and managed to pare the cost estimate down to \$800 million, but this was still too much.

MCPC looked for ways to tackle the transit needs, and in 2007, adopted the "KISS" (keep it simple...) approach as its goal to simplify the project in able to get something built. Mr. Bagley took the lead for the effort at MCPC and formed a Technical Advisory Committee with repre-

sentation from four counties (Berks, Chester, Delaware and Montgomery), the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission (DVRPC), the Norfolk Southern Railroad (owner of the freight rail line to be used for the service), and two transit operators, SEPTA and the Berks Area-Reading Transit Authority (BARTA), along with selected politicians. The intent was the examination of the feasibility and practicality of toll express lanes on the US 422 expressway that could fund highway and transit improvements in the corridor.

#### THE RAIL SIDE

Mr. Bagley noted that the effort's goal was the provision of a lower-cost alternative to SVM. This would consist of the northwestward extension of the SEPTA R6 Norristown line and the elimination of SVM's routing via the R6 Cynwyd line. The service would have three round trips in each peak period and one in the midday. Three rail options were reviewed — an extension to Valley Forge, a further extension westward in the 422 corridor, and the full line to Reading. Dual-mode (electric/diesel) equipment was evaluated to provide a one-seat ride. The maximum price tag for this was upwards of \$500 million.

Suggested funding sources were provided. Mr. Bagley explained that capital construction costs would use \$44 million in federal funds from a previous "earmark" project in the corridor, to be supplemented by a combination of state funds and toll revenue. Operating costs would be covered entirely by tolls, with any excess revenue not needed for road maintenance going to transit.

#### AND HOW ABOUT THE ROADS?

The review of the toll alternatives determined that the express toll lanes were not feasible, as there was no direct benefit especially in off-peak when congestion was not a significant factor. Mr. Bagley indicated that tolls on the three Schuylkill River crossings were then considered but dropped because of political opposition, and tolling will not be considered in this effort.

DVRPC is currently looking at a corridor master plan, and this is in development by McCormick Taylor Associates. It is very comprehensive and it includes the effects of 422 congestion on side/parallel roads. The study is projecting long delays, continued land development, increasing volume-capacity ratios (V/C), and considerable traffic diversion if 422 tolling is started. Mr. Bagley added that any toll would need Federal Highway Administration approval, and this is currently not being considered anywhere else in the US.

Mr. Bagley outlined the existing regional Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) projects included in it for 422 enhancement. Not surprisingly, the road's needs are much greater than the funding available (over \$650 million in projects vs. \$110 million in the TIP) and many identified projects have no prospect of funding. Cost increases as a result of inflation have also resulted in projects already on the TIP being underfunded by the time they are ready for implementation. When the transit costs of \$500 million are taken into consideration, the total toll revenue needed to make this all happen is \$1.25 billion.

#### **CAN IT BE DONE?**

As Mr. Bagley stated, there is no political will for tolls. The study reviewed the rates on other toll roads, including the Pennsylvania Turnpike, and set a 10 cents/mile cost as a reasonable starting point. The mileage-based rate is most fair to all users. Tolls would be collected via an automatic/ electronic method with high-speed toll collection. Revenue raised would be prioritized for road improvements, and used for rail capital costs if the three involved counties (Berks, Chester, Montgomery) and PennDOT were in agreement. In a web-based poll, it was learned that 3 of 4 people responding favor tolls.

The project is getting started this fall, when a traffic/revenue study will begin, along with outreach efforts and preliminary engineering on the issues on the existing Norfolk Southern rail line. Mr. Bagley advised that the \$44 million "earmark" will be pursued as starter money.

Mr. Bagley noted that more information is available on the project website, www.R6extension.com. He ably fielded several questions.

The Sections thanked Mr. Bagley for his insightful presentation and awarded him with their respective tokens of appreciation.



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
