# UPDATE ON PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT REQUIREMENTS

Vol. 84-1

As you may be aware, professional engineers, land surveyors and geologists in Pennsylvania are required to obtain continued professional development (CPD) credit to renew their licenses in 2011. This is effective as of October 1, 2009.

The specific requirements for PE's, LS's and PG's are available on the Department of State's website at **www.dos.state.pa.us/eng** for your information.

New Jersey has also instituted requirements for continuing education as effective **January 12**, **2011**. A current licensee shall be required to obtain 15 continuing professional competency credits during the current licensure period (which expires April 30, 2012), two of which shall be in professional practice ethics, to meet the requirements for the 2012–2014 biennial renewal period. Please visit the New Jersey State Board of Professional Engineers and Land Surveyors website for more information on this (www.nj.gov/lps/ca/pels/pels licensee.htm).

Additionally, the New Jersey Board requires that courses taken to satisfy the continuing education requirement be pre-approved by the Board. A listing of currently approved courses can be found at: http://www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/pels/pels\_licensee.htm.

It appears that the New Jersey Board does NOT intend to send notice of these regulatory changes to all licensed Engineers. Thus, you should the New Jersey Board site (http://www.njconsumeraffairs.gov/pels/) for updated information.

The Section is reviewing how to have our Section meeting program meet the New Jersey requirements to allow our members to obtain the credits they need for their New Jersey licenses. We will keep you updated on what happens here.

#### THE EXTRA MILER CLUB

If you're looking for something to do this summer and have run out of vacation spots and/ or ideas, here's something to ponder.

Since the Vikings first sailed into the Atlantic, adventuresome souls have been eager to experience the thrill of new sights, exotic flavors, and sheer adventure. Unfortunately for most individuals, travel opportunities are limited to dreaming about foreign lands, a few television specials and thumbing through dog-eared atlases National Geographic magazines. Nevertheless, every journey begins with the first step. If you love geography and road maps and yearn to travel and explore, you'll find a home in the Extra Miler Club.

The EMC is a group of about 300 chronic road trippers who share (approximately) the same goal: to visit, at least once in life, each and every county in the United States. "Extra Milers," as they are called, keep track of their progress by coloring in counties on state maps. Members pass on their travel tips and experiences in the group's quarterly newsletter, The Extra Miler. They share progress reports, photo albums, and stories of the road at EMC's annual meeting, which is held in a different city each summer.

EMC was founded in 1973 by Ed Dietz and Roy Carson. Ed and Roy met in 1958 through another common interest: collecting old license plates. Soon they met Tony Burdett (again through the license plate hobby) of Utah, who would become the third member of the (still to be formed) "club." In the summer of 1973, Roy and Ed were comparing maps when they decided to form an "official" organization, in the hopes of meeting others who shared this unique goal. Thus, the EMC was born.

As of this writing, only a handful of EMC members have actually completed all 3,000-plus jurisdictions. The final total can vary due to two major factors - first, what each member considers to be a "legitimate" jurisdiction, and second, the various geopolitical changes that have been made through the years. Some counties have been abolished, new ones have been created, and then there are other political subdivisions such as Alaska's boroughs, Virginia's independent cities, and Louisiana's parishes. A grand total may range from 3,127 to 3,145.

Although most members enjoy collecting counties and coloring in their maps, members often select their own personal travel goals as well, such as the highest and lowest points of elevation in each state, lighthouses, and Canadian and other countries' counties and jurisdictions.

Whatever personal travel goals you may wish to achieve, you will find a friendly welcome to the Extra Miler Club. As we like to say, "The shortest distance between two points is no fun!"

#### PHILADELPHIA LOW IMPACT DEVELOPMENT SYMPOSIUM

### GREENING THE URBAN ENVIRONMENT PHILADELPHIA – SEPTEMBER 25-28

Sponsored by the **Urban Water Resources Research Council** and the **Stormwater Infrastructure Committee**, this event will bring three separate organizations together at a single venue in the Philadelphia region. Each of these conferences has a different tradition which is blended together to enhance the experience while addressing each groups needs. The conference hotel has been chosen to be the **Loews** in Center City. Philadelphia is looking to Green its city, to address its CSO permit and to improve life in the city.

The 5th National LID Conference is focused

on bringing together the technical community to share ideas on how to build our cities while protecting our environment. The concept of LID is to simply not create the problem, and to utilize the natural environment in addressing changes to the water quality and quantity. The Conference is supported by the Urban Water Resources Research Council and the Stormwater Infrastructure Committee.

The 19th National NPS Monitoring Workshop is an important forum for sharing information and improving communication for controlling and monitoring NPS pollution issues and projects. Lessons learned and information presented at this

workshop will assist local project sponsors in the implementation of GLRI funded and other watershed projects.

The **2011 Pennsylvania Stormwater Management Symposium** is conducted to advance the knowledge and understanding of sustainable stormwater management for those dealing in all aspects of planning, design, construction, maintenance and operations, and regulatory compliance. The conference is held every two years at Villanova University, but has been moved to join with the other two assemblies.

As our numbers decrease, those of us in the business are getting busier, and the amount of time we may have for technical and professional groups could very well decrease. There are a number of societies that are seeing this happen – fortunately, we've remained strong. As I always say, the Section is a "good thing" and we should do our best to keep it that way. The group of folks taking that oath at the Social is a good group and I'm sure it will keep our "good thing" going.

We need to keep in mind as well that our Board is a group of volunteers who all have "day jobs". If you are interested in helping, please let us know.
