Philadelphia's skyline is about to change again. After years of being "ruled" by a gentlemen's agreement that no structure should be taller than William Penn's statue atop City Hall, the completion of Liberty Place in 1987 led the way for a number of new skyscrapers that dwarfed the Penn statue. Upon its opening later this year, the new **Comcast Tower** on John F. Kennedy Boulevard between 17th Street and 18th Street will surpass Liberty Place as the city's tallest building. The Thornton Tomasetti design team will present the challenges and difficulties faced and resolved with this undertaking.

ATC-20 POST-EARTHQUAKE SAFETY EVALUATION OF BUILDINGS TRAINING WORKSHOP

The ASCE Committee on Critical Infrastructure (CCI) is pleased to offer a training seminar on ATC-20 Post-Earthquake Safety Evaluation of Buildings immediately preceding the 2007 Structures Congress in Long Beach, CA, on May 16, 2007. The training is in cooperation with the Applied Technology Council (ATC). ATC has developed procedures for evaluating building safety after earthquakes in its publication, *Procedures for Post-earthquake Safety Evaluation of Buildings (ATC-20)*, which was first published in 1989.

ATC-20 provides procedures and guidelines for the safety evaluation of damaged buildings. These procedures and guidelines are written specifically for volunteer Structural Engineers, as well as Building Inspectors and Structural Engineers from city building departments and other regulatory agencies, who would be required to make on-the-spot evaluations and decisions regarding the continued use and occupancy of damaged buildings.



"ANACE" CORNER

Every so often, your Editor comes across something that he thinks will be of interest to you even though it has absolutely nothing about or concerning Engineering. Since technical folks tend to like acronyms, this can be shortened to "ANACE." In this vein, here's something appropriate for your St. Patrick's Day plans?

Strange But True... A Department of Beer

As the American colonies gained their independence way back when, one important item that would need to be addressed was the colonies' need for ale. English ale was a significant import for two main reasons — one, the barley needed for brewing couldn't be grown in New England, and, two, the early colonial cities were seaports, so imported beer was a natural.

George Washington, who was an avid porter drinker and brewed his own (his recipe remains on display at the New York Public Library), called for boycotts of imported English ales in the 1770's to help bolster the domestic beer industry, which, incidentally, was untaxed by the crown.

In 1789 James Madison led a successful effort to limit the new government's taxes on beer to help the domestic brewers once again. With the assistance of an English brewer displaced by the Revolution, Thomas Jefferson began to brew and bottle his own beer at his Monticello estate. A British entrepreneur, Joseph Coppinger, worked with Jefferson to create a government agency to actually brew beer, and this idea was proposed to President James Madison in 1810 in response to the soft import market as well as the government's fears that drinkers would turn to more readily-available harder stuff. Jefferson, at this point a former President, became an advocate for the creation of a national brewery, with Coppinger serving in the newly-created position of Secretary of the Brewery (or would it be Brewmaster General?).

Unfortunately, events leading up to the War of 1812 had become more pressing to Madison and the idea of the national brewery was dropped.

JANUARY DINNER MEETING

Wednesday, January 17, 2007 Radisson Hotel, Valley Forge, PA Everything You Always Wanted to Know About Transportation and PennDOT But Were Afraid to Ask

A rambunctious crowd of nearly 240 folks packed the room at the Radisson for the annual Joint Meeting between the American Society of Highway Engineers, Delaware Valley Section and our own Philadelphia Section. Delaware Valley Section President **Jeff Obrecht** opened the meeting with introductions, and after a short benediction, ASCE, Phila. Section President **Carol Martsolf** made several announcements.

PennDOT District 6 Assistant District Executive for Construction George Dunheimer gave introductory remarks for the evening's featured speaker, Rina Cutler, Deputy Secretary of Transportation and Acting District Executive, District 6. Ms. Cutler explained PennDOT's overall program in general and what District 6 encompasses (the five-county metropolitan Philadelphia region). District 6 is the smallest of PennDOT's 11 subareas but is the most populous, has the busiest roads and the most vehicle-miles traveled among the Districts.

Ms. Cutler noted that the recent party change in Congress has resulted in the rethinking of funding authorizations for critical projects, and this, coupled with Pennsylvania's own current reconsideration of how transportation efforts will be funded, has resulted in a slowdown of project production. As explained in the Transportation Funding Reform Commission's report (the subject of our November Section meeting), projected funding will not keep up with current needs and costs. Possible solutions are continued use of public/private partnerships ("3P"), increases in user fees such as tolls and fuel taxes, and other revenue enhancement measures. The newly-announced casinos and racinos in the state, four of which will be in District 6, come with added pressure for highway improvements to accommodate the expected traffic demand but without funding to provide for these needed improvements.

While the State's population is not growing rapidly, it is aging and sprawling, and Ms. Cutler explained that each of these "directions" must be adequately served. The aging population is increasingly depending upon mass transit, and funding resources are being targeted to transit in every portion of the state. The sprawl issue means that new facilities must be built and existing ones expanded to increase capacity. This comes with an additive factor of an increased maintenance burden at a time when PennDOT is hard-pressed to sustain the existing network.

Inflation in the construction industry has been severe in the past 18 months and Ms. Cutler remarked that this factor has taken its toll in both project programming and long-range planning. Funds for future projects must be "borrowed" to pay for higher costs for bids coming in now.

PennDOT has been involved in a major effort to "right-size" projects to account for this, but the realities of needs remain, and the aging and deteriorating infrastructure must be addressed.

Section Presidents Obrecht and Martsolf thanked Ms. Cutler for her insightful talk and presented her with tokens of each Section's appreciation for her effort.

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FEBRUARY DINNER MEETING

The ASCE, Philadelphia Section's annual Joint Meeting with the South Jersey Branch of the New Jersey Section saw a healthy crowd of about 90 attendees, of which about 40 from "our side" of the river ventured across the Delaware to hear about **Engineers Without Borders (EWB).** The meeting was, fortunately, held in Cherry Hill, closer to the City than previous meetings further "down the pike."

South Jersey Branch President Andy Feranda started the evening's activities with a few announcements, and then handed off to Section President Carol Martsolf for some updates on happenings in our Section.

After these announcements and updates, President Feranda introduced the Villanova University chapter of EWB to present its project. Chapter leader Sarah Arscott gave a rundown on the Chapter's efforts to build a new outdoor playground area at the Cadlau public school in New Orleans, which began in late 2005 and continued through the latter part of last year. Ms. Arscott displayed a number of photos of the effort, in which the Villanova chapter both designed and constructed the improvements. The work consisted of the removal of existing pavement and its replacement with topsoil/mulch, and the replacement of playground equipment.

Much of the work was done on holiday and class breaks, with at least one instance of "special dispensation" for final exams given. Schedules were tight and the working conditions were not always the most ideal, but the effort was a success and well received by the school's administration and students.

The **Rowan University** group focused on the town of El Amaton, El Salvador, and was tasked with means to provide fresh running water to the townsfolk. Before this effort was begun two years ago, the only way for the locals to get water was to walk to the nearby stream and transport it back in containers by hand.

The students determined the residents' needs and conducted a topographical survey to determine how to get the water reasonably close to each home. Flow rates for these needs were calculated and used to design the pumping, retention and distribution systems. As the effort began to show some success, the students had to contend with the town's mayor as he stepped in to "assist" in the effort. The group was able to obtain the assistance of local Peace Corps contacts to get its work done. The student team jointly presented a short slide show which illustrated its efforts.

Branch President **Feranda** and Section President **Martsolf** thanked the groups for their presentations and cited each student with a certificate of appreciation.



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
