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THEODORE DAVIS



Ted and Eleanor

With grief at the loss of a dear personal friend, your Editor sorrowfully reports the death, on April 4, 1983, of Theodore Davis, after an extended illness. Until his retirement from the office in the Spring of 1981, Ted Davis served faithfully as Philadelphia Section Treasurer for 25 years. He was named Treasurer Emeritus and continued to serve on the Board of Directors since his official retirement. For a two-year period (1961-1963) he served simultaneously as Treasurer and Membership Secretary.

As was characteristic of his overall nature and temperament, he served in the difficult and demanding offices unobstrusively, ungrudgingly, and with the highest efficiency. But Ted's duties and accomplishments far exceeded the bounds of normal official function. He was ever the expediter, coordinator and "leg-man" for updating membership lists, grade classifications and changes of address, working closely with and coordinating the business of the Section Secretary; Membership Committee; the Associate Member Forum; Technical Groups; Officers and Board of Directors; Administrative, Society Affairs and Special Tasks Committee. As Section liaison to the Board of Trustees of the Richard Humphrey Memorial Fund, he was constantly on the alert to the financial interrelationships between the Fund and the Section Operating Treasury. Every month, he prepared a clear, concise financial statement detailing the Section's income and expenses, for examination and approval by the Board of Directors at their meet-

If any Section business or function was in question or required completion or clarification, the conventional wisdom was to ". . . ask Ted Davis . . "

Just in case his ASCE work was not enough, Ted Davis filled out his time among an infinite variety of other activities. He conducted a Consulting Engineering practice in partnership with Section Past President Milton W. Rothbaum (trading as Rothbaum & Davis, Philadelphia) for many years, until the firm dissolved when Ted retired in March, 1980. Ted served for several years as a Councilman of the Borough of Hatboro, and sat on administrative and educational committees. In addition to ASCE, he was a member of other professional organizations, including the Penna. Society of Professional Engineers, the Society of American Military Engineers and the Engineers Club, Philadelphia. A major in the Army, he served overseas in World War II and the Korean War.

At the charming Hatboro home which Ted shared with his lovely wife, Eleanor, and in which they raised two fine sons: Stephen and John, Ted indulged in his favorite hobby, cabinet-making, in which he was recognized as an outstanding craftsman. Eleanor and Ted pridefully engaged in extensive vegetable gardening and horticulture. Each year as Springtime approached, they headed for their favorite lake and summer home or the seashore to enjoy their favorite sports: fishing, camping and beachcombing.

As one, all of Ted Davis' professional associates, military colleagues buddies, family, friends and neighbors recognized his qualities as a strong, sincere, competent individual who lived his own life to the fullest; and who contributed generously of himself when. ever he was asked. This is the great and everlasting legacy to us who knew him as a close friend and associate.

To Eleanor --- a Charter Member of the Section's Women's Auxiliary --- and their sons and their families, the Philadelphia Section, ASCE extends its hand and heart in deep-felt sympathy. We hope that they may find comfort in the assurance that we, as they, will not for-

MARCH MEETING

March 8, 1983

Engineers' Club

The Philadelphia Section's March meeting embraced as its subject the saga of the Space Age and engineering's part in its development for mankind. Jack Dickinson, Lead Systems Development Engineer, General Electric Company Space Systems Division; and former Project Manager for NASA on the Spacelab Program, Kennedy Space Center, was principal speaker. Mr. Dickinson's general subject was: "Engineering in Outer Space: Spacelab and the Space Shuttle."

University of Pennsylvania Night

The meeting honored the ASCE Student Chapter, Alumni and Faculty of the Civil Engineering Department of the University of Pennsylvania. Department Chairman, Dr. John Lepore, thanked the Section for its courtesies, and introduced the sizable contingent of Penn students, alumni and faculty at the meeting. He informed the assembly that the nomenclature "Urban Engineering" has been discontinued as a separate category in the Department since it is now fully integrated into the Civil Engineering curricula. Dr. Lepore announced that there are more than 1400 students in the School of Engineering and Applied Science. He is proud of the high scholastic standards which have been achieved in the student body.

An important innovation in the Department of Civil Engineering is the duel degree in engineering and geology, as part of the expanding Graduate Degree Program. The new course reflects the ever-increasing interaction between engineering and geology. Dr. Lepore envisions the fusion of the two specialties into the new branch of Geological Engineering.

Another ambitious development in process in the Graduate Program, described by Dr. Lepore, is the Master of Science and Doctorate Degrees in Transportation Engineering. A Transportation Resources, Management and Technology Research Institute, will be
