THE ROLE OF CIVIL/GEOTECHNICAL ENGINEERS IN ENVIRONMENTAL MANAGEMENT

The role of the Geotechnical Engineer in the planning and implementation of various national, industrial and local environmental programs has been progressively increasing since the advent of the National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) in 1970.

The purpose of this presentation is to provide an overview of specific functions and contributions of geotechnical engineers relative to the current national campaign for environmental restoration and management. Emphasis will be placed on technical and management tools that geotechnical engineers must master to meet these new challenges posed by this expanding role. The role of the geotechnical engineer as a manager of multi-disciplined efforts will be the primary theme for this presentation. Mr. Kempf, a Registered P.E. in five states including Pennsylvania, and a graduate of Villanova University with a B.S.C.E. (1949), is known for his work on numerous bridges in West Virginia, Ohio, Arizona, Illinois, and on the Trans-Alaska Pipeline. Other local projects undertaken by Mr. Kempf include design of the Betsy Ross Bridge and structural components of the Broad Street Subway tunnels.

During the past several years there have been four major bridges, including the Ben Franklin, which have been redecked in steel in licu of concrete. Reasons for selecting this type of decking will be discussed along with design details and some of the more significant items of construction. Mr. Kempf's firm, in conjunction with Weidlinger Associates, designed the project and performed on-site construction inspection for the Delaware River Port Authority.

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

SECTION PARTICIPATES IN BRIDGE LIGHTING PROJECT

The Philadelphia Section, ASCE, played an active and significant part in the endeavors of the Benjamin Franklin Bridge Lighting Project Committee an affiliate of the PENJERDEL Coun-The latter is a private, non-profit Tri-State organization (Pehrisylvania, New Jersey and Delaware) interested in improving the quality of life in the Region for business and residents. The participation culminated as part of the We The People 200 Constitution Day on September 17, 1987, with gala coremonies at Penn's Landing accompanying the official extraordinary lighting system which illuminates the towers, main cables and suspender cables with blue light, and the stone piers of the Bridge with amber color floodlights.

Against a background of spectacular fireworks and decoratively lighted ships and boats in the marina area adjoining the Bridge, the switch was thrown. Brillantly flooding the magnificent structure was an intricately designed sequential lighting scheme, including a chasing lighting effect on the vertical cables, triggered by computer coordination with PATCO trains traveling on the Bridge tracks

Representing the Philadelphia Section, ASCE, at the ceremonies and reception held on the Pier of the Phila. Marine Center adjoining the Bridge, were President Norman G. Weintraub, and Past Presidents John E. Durrant and Sid The Lighting Committee featured the Philadelphia Section in a live broadcast on TV Channel 6 at 10:30 P.M. at the Reception on September 17th. Weintaub, Durrant and Robin were interviewed by Channel 6 Commentator Tug McGraw, the great former Phillies pitcher. Sid Robin, acting as ASCE spokesman, discussed the report on "The History, Heritage and Legacy of the Benjamin Franklin Bridge," which he prepared for the Penjerdel Lighting Project Committee with the cooperation of the Division of Engineering, Delaware River Port, Authority, and the firm of Modjeski & Masters, Consulting Engineers, Har-risburg, PA. The report was distributed for broadcast on local radio and news media, as well as TV. Sid impressed on the listening and viewing television audience that the Ben Franklin Bridge was the manifestation through the design genius of the great Philadelphia Civil Engineer and ASCE member, Ralph Modjeski, original founder of Modjeski and Masters of the superlative civic creations of the Civil Engineers of our time. The Lighting Project, Sid emphasized, brings these realities into sharp focus and educates the general public about our proud achievements.



Dr. Pipes introduced the many faculty members present.
