the principal investigators on an international comparative study of how the form of cities has changed of the past 40 years, in response to the globalization of their economies, widespread motorization, and new communications technologies.

Prior to joining the University of Pennsylvania, Professor Hack taught for 25 years at MIT, and was a principal in the Cambridge Massachusetts firm of Carr, Lynch, Hack and Sandell.

He has prepared plans for over 30 cities in the US and abroad including, recently, the redevelopment plan for Prudential Center in Boston, the West Side Waterfront plan in New York City, and the new Metropolitan Plan for Bangkok, Thailand. He was responsible for the Hudson River Park at Battery Park City, a new 8 acre multi-use open space that is the principal amenity in that project. He is currently a member of the Studio Libeskind team that has submitted proposals for the World Trade Center site in New York. Earlier in his career he was responsible for the Canadian Govern-

ments housing and urban development research and demonstration programs, and initiated the development of several large neighborhoods and redevelopment of urban waterfronts in a number of Canadian cities.

He was educated in architecture at the University of Manitoba and the University of Illinois, where he also received his first planning degree, and has a Ph.D. in urban studies and planning from MIT.

Professor Hack is chairman of the Philadelphia City Planning Commission, and a member of the Board of the Philadelphia Industrial Development Commission, the Philadelphia Historical Commission, the Landscape Architecture Foundation and Heritage Pennsylvania.



### "SEPTA's Vision

An overflow audience of almost 250 members and guests of the five participating Engineering Societies, and Officers and members of the ASCE Student Chapter, Civil Engineering students, alumni and faculty of the Civil Engineering Department of Swarthmore College, attended a splendidly articulated presentation at the Joint Meeting at the Union League of Philadelphia in Center City. After a delightful steak dinner, cocktail and fellowship hour which preceded the formal meeting, the unusually large number of Societies in Joint Session heard the recently appointed General Manager of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Transportation Authority (SEPTA), Faye Moore, discuss the subject: "SEPTA's Vision." The participating Societies, in addition to the Philadelphia Section, ASCE, were: the Philadelphia Chapter, Women's Transportation Seminar (WTS); Philadelphia Section, Society of Women Engineers (SWE); Delaware Valley Chapter, Amerian Concrete Institute (ACI); and the Mid-Atlantic Section, Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE).

The meeting was chaired — in his usual excellent manner — by Philadelphia Section, ASCE President Ruben D. David, P.E., whose term of office enters its final two months in April. In his announcements prior to the Principal Speaker's presentation, Ruben paid tribute to women engineers, observing that it was indisputably appropriate for the meeting to be especially geared to the technologically accomplished women in engineering and their Societies, because March has been designated Women's History Month.

The meeting was generously sponsored by STV Incorporated, a full-service consulting firm offering planning, architecture, engineering, environmental and construction services. It has more than 1,300 professionals in offices across the United States, including Philadelphia, Boston, New York, Baltimore, Chicago, Los Angeles and San Francisco. A representative of STV made brief remarks about his company. Philadelphia Section President David and officers and representatives of the other participating Societies made announcements of interest and importance to their respective organizations.

### National ASCE President-Elect is Honored Guest

A special treat for the large and enthusiastic audience at the meeting was the presence and insightful remarks by recently elected ASCE National President-Elect Patricia Galloway, who next year will become the first female National ASCE President in its 150-year history, currently being celebrated by the Society — a historic achievement for Ms. Galloway.

In her remarks on National ASCE agenda, Ms. Galloway emphasized her overall vision of leadership and the vital roles Civil Engineers should play in political and technological decision-making processes. Her three principal objectives when she assumes the National ASCE Presi-

dency embrace the following: Public Policy; Ethics in Professionalism; and Globalization. Civil Engineers, she proclaims, are obliged to get involved in local and national politics; transportation and infrastructure development, and other major issues. Ethics in Professionalism is embodied in the ideals of attaining membership in one of the most prestigious professional organizations in the land, and maintaining the influence of that prestige and technological ability within the bounds of unassailable ethical principles. Globalization, said Ms. Galloway, entails the making of alliances within Local Sections of ASCE and chapters of other Technical Societies globally through Conferences and pursuit of mutual objectives and qualifications. Ms. Galloway harbors great pride in our profession — she is ordinately proud to be a Civil Engineer!

### Swarthmore College Night

The meeting honored the ASCE Student Chapter, alumni and faculty and Department of Civil Engineering of Swarthmore College. Philadelphia Section ASCE Past President (1999-2000) Dr. Faruq M.A. Siddiqui, Professor and Chair of Engineering at Swarthmore, and Faculty Advisor of the ASCE Student Chapter, thanked the Philadelphia Section, ASCE and the other participating Societies for the tribute and recognition afforded the Swarthmore Civil Engineering community. He reviewed the history of Swarthmore as a pioneering engineering school, and he is proud of the School's general engineering high national standing.

### ASCE Student Chapter Co-President Speaks

Swarthmore ASCE Student Chapter Co-President Michael Noreika acknowledged the students, alumni and faculty in the audience and thanked the Joint Meeting Societies for their courtesies. He introduced his fellow Officers: Co-President, Tim Lang; Secretary, Alex Flurie; Treasurer, Jesse Young; and alumni, Richard Mabry (\*63), and Daniel Hoenig (\*72).

Mike described the 2002-2003 year, in which the Chapter experienced many educational and exciting events. These included rewarding community service projects, the National ASCE Student Conference, and Delaware Valley Engineers' Week activities. On March 23, 2002, the Chapter volunteered to paint the interior of a Philadelphia Halfway House for AIDS patients. Last June, Officers Jesse Young and Alex Flurie attended the National ASCE Student Conference in Madison, WI. During last February's National Engineers' Week in the Delaware Valley, activities consisted of an all-campus display of the happening of Swarthmore engineering, including several major student projects, a history of engineering at Swarthmore, and interviews with faculty members. For the past month, the Chapter has been working on the American Concrete Institute Model Beam Competition, a project in which Swarthmore consistently participates. It was the winner last year of both the maximum load and best predicted load for specific deflection. Many other technical competition events and community projects participation are anticipated for the busy and progressive Chapter.

### Carol Martsolf Introduces Speaker

Philadelphia Section, ASCE Director Carol Martsolf introduced the evening's Featured Speaker, Faye Moore, General Manager of SEPTA. In her introduction, Ms. Martsolf noted that Ms. Moore is both the first woman General Manager in SEPTA's almost 40-year history as well as the first African American to hold this position.

Ms. Moore opened her presentation by thanking Phila. Section, ASCE President Ruben David for inviting her to speak. She added that he had told her the group would be 60 to 80 people, not the almost 250 of "his closest friends" that were in attendance.

Ms. Moore explained that she had prepared two versions of her speech. The first was the "exciting" version. As a result of recent events, she assembled another which she termed the "depressing" version. After some thought, she decided that she would deliver the "depressing" version.

### SEPTA System Defined

She presented some facts and figures about the SEPTA system, the fifth largest transit agency in the United States. It serves a coverage area of roughly 2200 square miles, which encompasses the five-county Philadelphia metropolitan area as well as small areas of New Jersey and Delaware. It operates 2400 vehicles of several different types (buses, trolleys, trackless trolleys, rapid transit and commuter rail), which all must be maintained in serviceable condition. There are about 9000 employees. Its challenge is to provide transit service in an environment in which funding sources are rapidly dwindling.

### Funding Challenges and Needs

Ms. Moore outlined her background and service, which has primarily been in the financial area at SEPTA (she served as the agency's treasurer for several years before moving to the General Manager position). Farebox revenues cannot cover all expenses. Subsidy funding and capital assistance are greatly needed, but in light of budget cuts at all levels of government, SEPTA must find more ways to be as self-sufficient as possible. With recent developments in the world, security has become a major concern, and costs for police and related services are correspondingly increasing.

Despite these factors, the challenge remains for SEPTA to respond to the transportation needs of the region. Ms. Moore cited one example of specialized late night service which could not be economically sustained. Even though there was a demand for this in several corridors, the cost could not justify it, especially on the labor-intensive Regional Rail system. The trend in decreased funding support does not bode well for this sort of service expansion in the future.

### SEPTA Staff Praised

Ms. Moore applauded the talents of SEPTA's

staff, especially the engineers, in the ongoing modernization and improvement of the system. She highlighted the model "station of the future", the Columbia/Cecil B. Moore station on the Broad Street Subway, which has many high-tech aspects that can be monitored from the Control Center at the Authority's Center City headquarters. She also hopes to be able to utilize local engineering talent on upcoming major "new start" projects such as the Schuylkill Valley Metro and other efforts to add "smart" aspects to existing vehicles.

### Economic Impact and Financial Challenges

She explained that every dollar spent by SEPTA has a multiplier factor of 6, and therefore has a significant economic impact in the region. Over 90% of the dollars spent by SEPTA goes to companies within the Authority's service area. She added that SEPTA, like the rest of us, is affected greatly by economic realities. She has watched the rapid rise in fuel prices affect the budget, both in diesel fuel costs and electric energy needs. Similarly, labor costs have increased dramatically, led by major rises in medical coverage.

### Customer Relations Necessities

Consistent with the theme of the meeting, "SEPTA's Vision", Ms. Moore explained that she continually stresses customer friendliness to her employees, and recognizes the critical need to give as accurate as possible service and delay information clearly to customers. She referenced the recent Regional Rail difficulties, which are directly related to aging infrastructure (70-year-old overhead catenary, which is currently being replaced).

### Question and Answer Discussion

Ms. Moore responded to several probing questions and comments on the feasibility of late night service, the anticipated effect of upcoming budgets on fares, ways to entice more ridership, and whether a fuel surcharge could be applied to fares to offset rapid fuel and other costs increases which are "soaring through the roof," while fare rate income and capital projects and maintenance subsidies from State and Federal agencies remain frozen – or even reduced – a daunting challenge.

Section President-Elect Allan Moore closed the meeting with remarks of interest. Along with President David and Director Carol Martsolf, he thanked Ms. Moore for her insightful presentation. Ms. Moore was presented Gifts of Appreciation from both the Women's Transportation Seminar and the Phila. Section, ASCE.

Capitol. When completed, the building will contain 580,000 sq. ft. on three levels, requiring a 196,000-square-foot excavation. The Capitol itself encompasses 775,000 square feet.

The diaphragm wall foundation will act as permanent water cut-off and structural wall to the three-level structure. The support of excavation system will be the combination of the diaphragm wall, temporary tiebacks and cross bracing. The original construction sequence called for a top-down sequence with potential impacts to the schedule due to the contemporary installation of caissons and diaphragm wall. Nicholson/Centex proposed a revised construction sequence using a bottom-up sequence outlining the advantages to the schedule and cost savings. The revised sequence was approved by the Owner for final construction.
