The events of September 11, 2001 in New York City resulted in the severing of the Port Authority Trans Hudson's (PATH) rapid transit line from Exchange Place in Jersey City to the World Trade Center, also known as the "downtown" line. The Trade Center terminal was heavily damaged, but the tunnels which carry PATH trains beneath the Hudson River were also affected by flooding from water main breaks in New York City and firefighting at the Trade Center site. The tunnels were left unusable, forcing nearly 100,000 daily PATH riders to find alternate means to continue their trips from the New Jersey side of the Hudson River to New York. A second PATH route, the "uptown" line to midtown Manhattan, became severely overcrowded as a result of this closure. The immediate prohibition of private auto entry into lower Manhattan after the events of September 11 only compounded the situation, as many who formerly drove now sought transit alternatives.

PATH's governing body, the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey (PA), and, ironically, the principal tenant and one-time owner of the World Trade Center, worked feverously to re-establish the "downtown" link. The first order of business was the clearance of the Trade Center site, but the tunnels, track, signals, etc. would have to be rehabilitated and ready for service when the new Trade Center terminal would be available. PATH also had to find over \$500 million in funding to pay for the work.

Messrs. Vigrass and Griffin will outline the work and how it was completed on an accelerated schedule. An operational headache was resolved on the New Jersey side, with the completion of new tunnels to allow trains to turn back at Exchange Place. The original layout of the line, dating to 1908, did not provide this flexibility. With the new facilities in place, limited service was resumed from PATH's New Jersey terminals to Exchange Place on April 29, 2003. Full service to the new World Trade Center temporary terminal was begun on November 23, 2003.

J. William Vigrass has over 50 years in the transportation industry. For the past 15 years, he has served as a Project Manager for Hill International. He is currently a member of a team led by STV Inc. planning fixed guideway transit in southern New Jersey for the Route 55 Transit Corridor (Continued on Page 2)

New Jersey Transit (NJT) initiated major new vehicle fleet procurements in 1999. It engaged a consultant, STV Inc., to provide engineering support and inspection services for the simultaneous procurement of three different rolling stock fleets: 265 locomotive- hauled Push/Pull type coaches (including 100 cab cars), 33 7000-HP electric locomotives, and 29 4000-HP diesel electric locomotives.

STV performed in the role of oversight and specification compliance assurance along with the day to day management of the documentation

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WILL HEISER

Section Past President Will Heiser passed away on October 9, 2003, in his retirement home in Croasdaile, North Carolina. He was 86.

Mr. Heiser was employed by Justin and Courtney Engineers, a Philadelphia-based engineering firm which specialized in water resources. He was active on both the domestic and international scenes. He worked on the Bhakra Dam in Lahore, Pakistan, and on smaller dams and irrigation projects in Iran and South Korea.

Mr. Heiser served as President of the Philadelphia Section in 1976-77 and was selected as the Section's Outstanding Civil Engineer in 1979. His tenure as Section President was especially notable as it encompassed the Bicentennial Anniversary of the United States. The Section made its mark in that celebration as it hosted the ASCE National Convention (September 27-October 3, 1976). Mr. Heiser played the role of Convention host to perfection.

Mr. Heiser was instrumental in the creation of the Section's Reading Branch, which came into being in 1975.

Mr. Heiser is survived by his wife, Audrey, who for many years headed the Section's Women's Auxiliary, and their children Marcia, David (JoAnn), and Charles (Donna).

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

January 14, 2004

Radisson Hotel, Valley Forge "Moving Pennsylvania Forward"

A turnout of nearly 250 braved the threat of snow for this joint meeting co-sponsored by the Delaware Valley Section of the American Society of Highway Engineers (ASHE), the ASCE, Philadelphia Section, and ASCE, Reading Branch. The joint ASHE/ASCE meeting, which has been held for more than a dozen years, proved to be another successful venture for both societies.

ASHE Section President Alan Pizzi opened the meeting and welcomed the attendees with introductions of those at the head table. A short invocation was offered by Section Past President Ruben David, followed by announcements on Engineers Week activities offered by ASHE National Director Richard Prentice. ASCE, Phila. Section President Allan Moore provided some Section announcements and cited the meeting's sponsor, STV Incorporated. He also introduced PennDOT District 6 Executive Andrew Warren, who presented the evening's speaker with his usual short, humorous banter.

The Secretary of Transportation

The Secretary of Transportation for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Allen Biehler, took the podium and began his presentation by citing the many PennDOT employees in the audience. He emphasized that the success of PennDOT is dependent on the men and women of the agency, especially at the District level. He added that he was relieved that the District's maintenance people were not at the meeting since they had to prepare for the impending snow event.

Secretary Biehler explained that the State Transportation Commission, which oversees PennDOT's work, was starting to update its Twelve-Year Program, as it does biennially. Public hearings have been held throughout the State on this, which is PennDOT's long-range funding vehicle. The many and varied transportation needs of the citizens of Pennsylvania are difficult to meet, however, especially when needs are greatly in excess of revenues. The current view of the Twelve-Year Program is attempting to address how to deal with this discrepancy.

Population trends in Pennsylvania, as in many other states, have seen an exodus out of cities into newly-developing areas. This decentralization, or sprawl, is having a significant impact on the needs side of the equation, as new roads must be provided to new developments. Since many commuters are still traveling long distances and using existing facilities that must also be maintained with State funding, the challenge remains as to how to spend the limited resources available.

Secretary Biehler displayed a chart showing population trends versus undeveloped land in the Pittsburgh metropolitan area over the past 70 years. While the population has stayed at 2.5 million throughout that period, its concentration in the city itself in 1930 is vastly different from the current situation in which it is spread over the entire nine-county area. A similar trend was shown for Philadelphia, although the overall population has grown in our area.

And Then There's Transit...

Secretary Biehler noted that there are underutilized transit corridors and lines that often parallel crowded highways. He demonstrated the local example of I-76, the Schuylkill Expressway, that is close to SEPTA's R5 Paoli/Thorndale, R6 Norristown and R6 Cynwyd regional rail lines as well as its Route 100 Norristown high-speed rail line. Many of those who could use the SEPTA lines have moved further away from them, making them less convenient. The transit lines do not easily adapt to serve new centers of residential and commercial development, and much of the population that once lived near and used the lines have relocated. He gave another example of how the King of Prussia mall/office complex is not close to SEPTA regional rail.

Past funding trends had available federal highway and transit dollars at nearly equal amounts nationally from the late 1950s until 1978. Since then, federal legislation has greatly favored the highway side. Unfortunately, this has left many transit needs unmet and has resulted in budgetary and other difficulties for transit authorities. Secretary Biehler explained that, while more equity is needed for transit funding, this could undermine basic levels of highway dollars and possibly leave more needs unmet.

Land Use Strategies

Secretary Biehler highlighted a conference on land use and planning, sponsored by four different State agencies, including PennDOT, in summer 2003. The basic concept was a comprehensive review of land use policies. Changing strategies in investments were reviewed, concentrating on sprawl reduction. Emphasis was given on the ways to strengthen the cores of the State's munici-

palities, many of which are economically distressed. Ways to link transportation planning, land use and community values were proposed and explored. As Secretary Biehler stated at the start of his talk, this is not business as usual for PennDOT.

Questions/Answers

In response to a question on proposed Turnpike toll increases, Secretary Biehler remarked that he fully supported toll hikes. Additional funding is needed to maintain the infrastructure of the Turnpike and expand it to respond to changing demand. PennDOT is reviewing the possibility of imposition of tolls on I-80, but this may not be self-sustaining.

PennDOT is doing what it can to attract and support business to the Commonwealth. Goods movement and accommodation of the increasing volume of truck traffic is key to this.

A question was raised on the historic lock/canal network in the State and possible uses for tourism. Secretary Biehler explained that PennDOT is working with the Corps of Engineers and other partners to address this.

ASHE Section President Pizzi and ASCE, Phila. Section President Moore thanked Secretary Biehler for his informative presentation and offered him tokens of each Section's appreciation.

While no one mentioned it, this event was a successful "Night of Allans" (Secretary Allen Biehler, ASHE President Alan Pizzi, and Section President Allan Moore) which may never be repeated!





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


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SECTION HISTORY

Here are some notable events that occurred in the Section in the month of February:

1917 - Sid Robin was born in Philadelphia on February 3. The Section had been in existence for four years at this point.

1926 - The topic of the Section meeting for the month was "Design and Construction of the Broad Street Subway", which was touted as having all the latest innovations and a modern marvel for the City. The first operating segment of the Subway, from City Hall to Olney, opened on September 1, 1928.

1931 - Initial steps were taken to set up the Section's Junior Forum. This became known as the Associate Member Forum in 1959 and later evolved to the present-day Younger Member Forum in 1982.

1952 - The Section's Central Pennsylvania Sub-Section was established. This became the Central Pennsylvania Section in February 1958.

1953 - A new group, Delaware Valley Engineers Week Council, an offshoot of the Philadelphia Chapter of the Pennsylvania Society of Professional Engineers, starts a local celebration of Engineers Week.

1953 - The Section's Trenton Sub-Section was established. This would become the Trenton Branch, and later moved to become a Branch of the New Jersey Section.

1956 - Past Section President Francis Friel was nominated for National Vice President.

WORD CORNER

THE NEWS will occasionally feature information on how some words that engineers like to use made their ways into the lexicon. This month's word is GADGET.

From many accounts, the word gadget accompanied the Statue of Liberty to the United States in the 1880s. The French donated the Statue to the people of the United States but funds only covered fabrication and delivery to the site. The cost of erection and the Statue's pedestal had to be borne by private citizens. Some Americans saw this as a slap in the face and wondered whether the gift was worth the cost of placement. It became quite the controversy of the time.

As we now know, those who wanted to keep the Statue won out and raised the funds to erect it. Once it was in place, however, sentiment turned and most Americans quickly and proudly accepted the Statue as a national symbol. This popularity spread nationwide and led to the sale of many miniature replicas of the Statue.

The French firm that built the statue was Gaget and Gauthier. This same firm built many of the miniature replicas and engraved its name prominently on them. The name Gaget began to be associated by Americans with anything strange and interesting. This is believed to have evolved to become the term 'gadget.'

SECTION HUMPHREY FUND SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM


Once again, the Section will conduct its undergraduate scholarship program this year. Scholarships will be awarded at our Annual Spring Social/Dinner Dance.

WHY IS THE NEWS ONLY 76? (PART II)

For some reason, many of us seem to enjoy sequels. If you are a "sequel" person, here is something you might like - a follow-up to the article on THE NEWS that appeared in the December 03/January 04 edition ("Philadelphia Section 90, THE NEWS 76").

In a not very exhaustive search of our records, we learned that THE NEWS actually came about as a result of a Section Board resolution. The ac-

tion, passed by the Board at its meeting of March 5, 1928, authorized the printing "... from time to time of a tabloid newspaper giving information of interest to members of the Section relating to meetings, membership, Society affairs, etc...".

With this auspicious start, THE NEWS began publication and distribution with Volume 1, Number 1 in November 1928. It has been in continuous production since then, with the exception of the 1957-58 season as explained in the December/ January edition.



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
